Course description: This course presents the fundamentals of classical physical optics in sufficient depth to provide both a solid understanding of optical phenomena, and a solid background for research in contemporary optics. Fundamental ideas are unified through a mathematical treatment emphasizing Fourier analysis and linear systems theory for the description of linear wave propagation. Core topics include the propagation and interaction of optical fields and waves in matter, the vector nature of polarization phenomena, and the wave nature of light including temporal coherence and interferometry and spatial coherence and diffraction (Fourier optics). Specialized topics of interest include Gaussian transverse mode analysis and laser resonator optics, nonlinear optics including the coupled wave theory of second harmonic generation, and the theory and operation of the Laser Intererometer Gravitational-Wave Observatory.
